


## Other hikes in Flørli



### Flørli Klippevandring & Kallaliklumpen

A 2-3 hour hike. Ascend through forest roads to the cliff base, then up wooden steps along a mountain ledge. Reach the boulder Kallaliklumpen, loop through the forest, and return to the village. **Warning:** Steep and exposed sections! Not suitable for people with vertigo. Kallaliklumpen may not be safe. Stand on it at your own risk.



### Fossastien

A 2-hour hike. Follow the river to the waterfall's base, then ascend on wooden stairs. Stunning views and a picnic spot at the top. Continue through a forest, offering different waterfall views before descending back to Flørli. **Warning:** steep and slippery stairs. One-way only.



### Flørneset opp

A 1-hour hike. Walk along the shore to Flørneset. Ascend steeply for stunning views over Flørli and the Lysefjord. The path eventually reaches a forest road, leading back down through the village. **Warning:** exposed sections; not suitable for people with vertigo.

## Please respect the following



Leave no trace - carry out all trash.  
There are no garbage bins along the trail.



Visit the toilet before your hike.  
There are no toilets along the trail.



Drones are only allowed **outside** Frafjordheiane landskapsvernombord (Protected Landscape Area).



General bonfire ban April 15 - September 15. At Flørli Campsite, there are dedicated fire pits.



The staircase can only be hiked UP and is not recommended for people with severe vertigo.



Stay on the trail.  
Pay attention to signs and marking.



Consider your hiking skills, current conditions and changing weather.



Use proper gear. Bring a backpack with enough food, water and warm clothes.



Camping in the Flørli settlement is **only** allowed at the campsite.



There are sheep grazing along the trails.  
Keep your dog on a leash. Pick up dog poop.

### Flørli Staircase

Difficulty	demanding
Distance	5 km (loop)
Duration	4-5 hour (loop)
Total elevation gain	750 meters
Summer season	May - October


Challenge yourself by hiking the world's longest wooden staircase, ascending to an elevation of 750 meters above sea level. As you climb from Flørli, you'll be treated to breathtaking views of the Lysefjord and its surrounding mountains. The initial 2 kilometers of your journey involve conquering the 4,444 steps of this renowned staircase. For your descent, we recommend taking the "Rallarstien" trail, which winds through the forest and leads you back to Flørli village.

## Flørli

Flørli, a roadless village in the Lysefjord, is a former power plant community known for its history and the 4444-step Flørli stairs. The village's hydropower history is showcased in the former power station, where visitors can explore an exposition and enjoy the summer-open Power Café.

Dating back to the 1600s, Flørli began as a farming and sawmill village. The original farmhouse is now a tourist cabin. In 1914, Einar Meling purchased Flørli, founding a power company in 1916. Despite initial challenges, the power plant developed into a small industrial community with a pier, rail track, and the famous staircase. However, Flørli's significance declined after the 1950s, when a power plant in Lysebotn opened. The last resident left in 1999, when Flørli's power plant was replaced with a new, automated version inside the mountain.

Today, Flørli is a unique tourist destination, offering a variety of outdoor adventures. Close to the Frafjordheiane Landscape Reserve, visitors can enjoy hiking, kayaking, fishing, and more. Explore the waterfall and cliff trails, known for their steep, demanding routes and stunning views. At Flørli, there is so much to do and see: you should stay longer than just a day.

## Welcome to the Lysefjord

The Lysefjord offers some of the world's most iconic hikes. The classics Preikestolen, Kjerag and Flørli are most known, but the 42 km long Lysefjord is also home to a wide range of other more off the beaten track hikes, all with great vistas.

On the map (→), we have selected our local favorites in the Lysefjord: the **top 10 hikes** with a fjord view.

Flørli is also part of the **Lysefjorden Rundt** Trail, one of the country's most spectacular multi-day hiking trails. It connects Flørli with Kjerag and Preikestolen, running from fjord to mountain, and back down again several times. It winds past old mountain farms, former hydropower settlements, mountain lakes, gorges and rock cliffs, over bedrock and through lush forests. In addition to beautiful nature, you can discover many cultural-historical treasures.

## Getting to Flørli

Flørli is only accessible by ferry, with your own boat or by hiking across the mountains.

You can leave your car on the quays in Lauvvik, Forsand, Songesand or Lysebotn and take a passenger ferry. If you bring your car on the car ferry, you park it on the quay in Flørli and walk 300 meters to the village. There are no roads in Flørli.

Besides the local Kolumbus ferry ([lysefjorden365.com/ferry](http://lysefjorden365.com/ferry)), you can also reach Flørli with Rødne Fjord Cruise ([rodne.no](http://rodne.no)) or taxi boats. You can even rent your own boat! The dock facility at Flørli is free to use, including overnight stays. The dock consists of: a 100-meter-long small boat dock with 10 mooring buoys, a kayak ramp, and a small deep-water quay.

## Accommodation in Flørli

Flørli has several options for those who want to spend a longer time in Flørli. Flørli 4444 ([florli.no](http://florli.no)) has four rental apartments, Flørli Historic Hostel and a few themed rooms with shared facilities. All houses and most rooms have a fjord view.

The Stavanger Trekking Association runs Flørli Tourist Station, the oldest house in Flørli, and the charming Flørlistølen cottage, located in the middle of a forest, higher above the Lysefjord. See [ut.no](http://ut.no)

### Frafjordheiane Protected Landscape Area

Flørli as a gateway to the protected landscape area (*landskapsvernområde* in Norwegian) of Frafjordheiane. It is part of a system of 17 protected zones in Setesdal and Ryfylke, established to conserve a truly unique and awe-inspiring landscape. It is home to Europe's southernmost wild reindeer population. Please treat our protected zones with respect they deserve. Stay on the trails, don't take anything but pictures, and leave nothing but your footprints. Thank you!
